



## After the Fires: Assessing the impact of the 2019-2020 bushfires on community responders

### Participant Information Form – Survey

#### Invitation:

You have been invited to take part in a national survey of the wellbeing and resilience of employees and volunteers who responded to the 2019-20 bushfires. Fire and emergency service workers and volunteers along with local government authority staff are being asked to participate. The survey is being conducted by Roy Morgan Research and Curtin University. This study was based at The University of Western Australia in 2022.

#### Aim of the Study (What is the project about?)

The impacts of major bushfires can be substantial and ongoing. In addition to the loss of life and property, the psychological impacts of bushfires can be common and long-lasting. Following the devastating 2019-20 bushfire season, where many local government authority staff were involved in responding to the fires, there is a critical need to monitor the impacts of the bushfires and associated events on those involved. In particular, this means understanding the support needed by those who may have been affected by the fires and how to foster resilience and effective coping strategies.

#### Who can take part in the survey?

Over 5,000 employees and volunteers in fire and rescue and state emergency services as well as local government authorities across Australia have been invited to participate in the survey.

#### What does participation involve?

Participation in the survey involves answering a series of questions about your work and your health and wellbeing. The survey will take about 10-15 minutes on average.

#### Voluntary Participation and Withdrawal from the Study

Your participation in the survey is completely voluntary. If you choose to participate, we hope that you will answer all questions. If you can't or do not feel comfortable providing an answer to any question, you do not have to do so, and can just move on to the next question.

Should you wish, you can withdraw from the survey at any time. As all data collected in the survey will be completely anonymous, once you have completed the questionnaire it will not be possible to withdraw from the survey.

## Your privacy

The information that you provide will be held securely and managed by Roy Morgan Research and Curtin University. The information you provide will be collected anonymously. Information that could possibly identify you, such as name, date of birth or IP address will not be recorded. The survey software is provided by Roy Morgan Research and is completely independent of your organisation's IT environment. Your agency will not see or be able to access any information that you provide. All information that could potentially identify you will be removed before the data is analysed by researchers and used in any reports. Survey data will be securely stored on Curtin University's Institutional Research Data Store for a minimum of seven years after the date of project completion.

## Possible Benefits

Information from the survey will be used to inform the development of strategies and programs to build resilience and most effectively support the wellbeing of those who respond to major events like the 2019-20 bushfires.
